

Business Update

The Dragonfly Project (TDP) is now 19 years old. Since we started in 2002, we have sent out over 130,000 dragonfly packets, each representing an individual or family touched by our mission. In 2020, we sent out over 11,000 packets. More than half of these were from our website. Almost a quarter of these were sent as part of the Adopt-a-State program. In this program, volunteers find people to send a packet to from looking at obituaries taken from newspapers or other sources. Our Adopt-a-State volunteers shrank from 57 to 50 at the end of 2020. The number of states impacted by this program decreased from 39 to 36. We also added Canada to our outreach in 2020. We could use some more Adopt-a-State volunteers!

We sent out 240 packets and 100 Dragonfly Door books to 4 different schools, as part of our School Outreach program, in February of 2020. In this type of outreach, we send out packets to families and staff after the loss of a student, and provide copies of *The Dragonfly Door* book. This outreach was severely impacted by COVID-19, which closed schools, and limited volunteer gatherings.

We gave an additional 90 books as part of our *Dragonfly Door* outreach. This included 31 books distributed to Survivor Resources, which offers crisis response, grief support and other services for families of victims of death due to homicide, suicide, accidental overdose, and violent death. We also put books in Minneapolis little libraries, including some in south Minneapolis in memory of George Floyd.

Financially, TDP continues to do well. Although our numbers were down, this was mostly related to the cancelation of our annual event, in which we had expenses but raised little funds. Our Gross Profit was around \$56,000, a 10% decrease from the previous year. Our expenses were a little higher at about \$44,000. Our Net Income was approximately \$20,400, a 20% decrease from 2019. We continue to have a very strong balance sheet.

HERE ARE SOME OTHER HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2020:

Due to the pandemic, our packet making events had to take on a different approach. Instead of traveling to locations around the Twin Cities for volunteer help in assembling our packets (a condolence card with the dragonfly story and a dragonfly keychain), we needed to make boxes of supplies for local volunteers to pick up and do in their own homes. This was a challenge and we miss forming relationships with the people who volunteer with us.

Nativity Lutheran Church and its members were involved in packet events where volunteers assembled 6,923 packets. Because Nativity had local volunteers for our new packet process, this is three times as many packets than they made last year. We needed them. Only one of these events were held as a group in person. All other events were virtual or done in homes. Nativity supports The Dragonfly Project in many ways including lending space for events and board meetings, and promoting our mission.

Thrivent Financial and its members were involved in three events where they assembled 1,163 packets and 1,079 extra keychains. Thrivent was also restricted by the pandemic. Thrivent Financial is our number one financial supporter through their many different programs.

The Dragonfly Project started a relationship with Camp Penuel in Costa Rica to bring comfort to those in Hispanic areas who have recently lost a loved one. Camp Penuel's vision is to love others with God's love. They do this by bringing children and youth from impoverished areas to a camp-like setting. Camp Penuel staff is distributing Spanish dragonfly cards and keychains to those needing a message of hope.

TDP continues forming a relationship with The Compassionate Friends organization. We sponsored their candle lighting session at their virtual annual meeting this year. The pandemic has restricted our other collaboration projects.

We welcomed Jennifer DeBruin as a new Dragonfly Project board member. Jennifer comes to us with a wealth of business experience. She is currently a manager in the Life Insurance Operations area at Thrivent Financial.
